Letter from the Founder, Khayamandi Foundation

Imagine a world where the impossible becomes possible.

A world where immense need is met with action, and lives burdened by desperation are transformed—not just for today, but for generations to come.

Sounds far-fetched? Perhaps. But hold that thought for a moment.

This past summer, I witnessed something that profoundly changed me. I had the privilege of seeing the work the Khayamandi Foundation is doing in rural Uganda, ministering to refugees from South Sudan. The experience was nothing short of a wake-up call.

The poverty, the emotional distress, the sheer fight for survival hits you like a

sledgehammer. Over 2 million refugees are scattered across Northern Uganda, welcomed by a government that, while well-meaning, lacks the resources to provide the support they desperately need.

This isn't just another story about global poverty. It's about a specific place, a specific need, and a specific opportunity to make a difference.



I met a teenage girl named Nyabuom.



At just 16 years old, Nyabuom is the sole caregiver for her four younger siblings. They live in a mud hut near our work area, in Omugo 6 of the Rhino refugee settlement. Their mother passed away in 2016. Their father has been missing since 2020, likely a casualty of the war in South Sudan.

In 2024, their step mother, overwhelmed by trauma, abandoned them.

Now, Nyabuom is both mother and father to her siblings. "I don't know if my step mother will ever return," Nyabuom said, her voice tinged with

both hope and resignation. "But if she does, I'll tell her that the children almost died in my care because we had no food."

How does a teenager provide food and shelter when she has nothing? How does she hold it together emotionally under such crushing odds?

These questions have haunted me since I returned to the comfort of my first-world life. They've driven me to think deeply about how we, as a small but determined foundation, can make a meaningful impact.

A Vision for Change

Here's where we started:

1. Basic Needs First

- **Water:** Without water, there is no life. A well must be dug, taps installed, and a distribution system put in place. **So Khayamandi Foundation extended the system in 2025.**
- **Shelter and Food:** Refugees can build small huts and plant subsistence crops nearby. **So Khayamandi Foundation is starting a farming program in 2026.**

2. A Safe Haven

- Establish a “lighthouse” shelter system, like our Early Childhood Development Center, where 400–1000 children gather daily for a nutritious meal and basic education. **We had full attendance in 2025.**
- Create a sports field and recreation area to give children a chance to play, grow, and heal.



Beyond Survival: Building a Future

Once basic needs are met, the real work begins - helping refugees move from survival to self-sufficiency.



3. Healthcare

- Build a primary healthcare facility staffed by trained individuals from the refugee community.



4. Empowerment Through Sports

- Engage young men and women in maintaining sports fields, earning a small wage while fostering pride and ownership.
- Host sports clinics and invite prominent athletes to inspire and train the youth.
- Organize tournaments to connect with other communities and build camaraderie.



5. Agriculture and Industry.

- Develop a communal farm to grow fruits and vegetables, fostering productivity and the beginnings of wealth creation.
- Establish small cottage industries - sewing, woodworking, plumbing - where skills can be developed, and products sold locally.



6. Housing and Financial Growth

- Transition from mud huts to basic wood-framed houses.
- Introduce supervised banking systems to encourage saving and financial literacy.

A Model for Replication

By this stage, a small, thriving village emerges - a beacon of hope that can inspire and be replicated in other areas. Of course, there are challenges: greed, politics, crime, and the ever-present risk of failure. But there are also countless reasons to believe this can work.

The key, as always, is funding and people.

Where there's a will, there's a way. This vision is just beginning to take shape, but with focus, determination, and the right support, it can grow into something extraordinary.

Who we are

The Khayamandi Foundation is a nonprofit organization dedicated to fostering lasting change in African communities. Our mission is to empower local leaders and invest in the next generation, creating pathways for children and youth to grow, learn, and lead.

By addressing critical needs and building sustainable solutions, we aim to uplift communities and unlock their full potential.

Why We Do What We Do

At Khayamandi Foundation, our work is driven by a deep belief in the dignity and potential of every individual. We act because:

- **Clean water** should never be a daily struggle - it's a basic human right.
- **Children** deserve access to **education, safety, and nourishment** to unlock their full potential.
- **Communities** flourish when people have access to meaningful work and sustainable livelihoods.
- **Healing from trauma** requires safe spaces, compassion, and faith to rebuild lives.
- **Every life** holds inherent dignity, and every person is imbued with God-given potential to make a difference.

What Makes Us Different

We stand apart because of our commitment to sustainable, community-driven transformation

- **No quick fixes:** We focus on long-term solutions that create lasting impact, rather than temporary relief.
- **Empowerment over intervention:** Instead of taking over, we partner with and empower local leaders who are already making a difference in their communities.
- **Generational change:** We believe that small, consistent steps - taken together - can spark transformation that lasts for generations.

Our model for change



1. Identifying Local Leaders in Africa

We begin by recognizing and empowering local leaders through a process of discipling, training, and teaching. These leaders are the catalysts for transformation within their communities.



2. Understanding Community Needs

Together with these leaders, we identify the pressing needs in their communities, such as access to safe housing, clean water, proper nutrition, quality education, and skills development opportunities.



3. Mobilizing Resources

By connecting with donors, volunteers, and partner organizations, we channel essential resources to address these needs effectively.



4. Breaking the Cycle of Poverty

Through these efforts, we aim to break the cycles of poverty, fostering hope, restoring dignity, and empowering individuals to take charge of their futures.



5. Building Sustainable, Healthy Communities

Our ultimate goal is to create thriving, self-sustaining communities where people can live with health, stability, and opportunity for generations to come.

Our work

Early Childhood Development and Youth Programs

Newlife ECD

At the heart of our mission is the belief that every child deserves a strong start in life. Through the New Life Early Childhood Development (ECD) Center, we provide early childhood education and nutritious meals to 400 children aged 3–6. This program not only lays the foundation for lifelong learning and health but also addresses critical developmental needs during these formative years.

Recognizing the importance of holistic growth, our after-school sports program engages over 350 youth, offering a safe space to develop physical well-being, teamwork, and self-confidence. Beyond the children, we are committed to empowering the community by employing over 22 local staff members - including teachers, cleaners and security personnel.

This creates dignified jobs, strengthens local leadership, and builds skills that benefit the entire community.



Economic Empowerment and Livelihoods

Missions Café & Guest House

Our Missions Café & Guest House is more than a hospitality business - it's a platform for empowerment. By providing employment and hands-on training in the hospitality industry, we equip 12 local Ugandans with the tools to build sustainable livelihoods. This initiative enables them to support their families with dignity and pride.

Additionally, our gift shop serves as a marketplace for local artisans, showcasing their handcrafted goods. This not only helps artisans share their work with a broader audience but also provides them with a reliable source of income, fostering economic growth within the community.





Clean Water and Sanitation (WASH)

Clean & Safe Drinking Water

Access to clean and safe drinking water is a fundamental human right, yet it remains a challenge for many communities. Beyond our educational initiatives, we ensure that both our school and over 3,000 community members have access to clean water. This effort promotes better health, reduces the spread of waterborne diseases, and strengthens the resilience of the community as a whole.

Food Relief and Crisis Intervention

Food Relief

“It’s hard to tell a man about the future in heaven when he’s dying for lack of a piece of bread - Bob Pierce.”

Food is not just a basic need - it is the foundation of survival. Unfortunately, funding cuts have led to the removal of many individuals - those not classified as “vulnerable” from monthly food ration lists. This has resulted in widespread hunger, starvation, and even death.

At Khayamandi Foundation Uganda, we believe no one should go hungry. Through the generosity of our donors and partners, we have stepped up to provide food relief to those in need, ensuring that families can meet this most essential requirement for life.

Key Statistics

- According to the UNHCR, Uganda’s budget for 1.4 million refugees in 2017 was \$551 million. Despite the refugee population now nearing 2 million, the proposed budget has been reduced by 35% to \$361 million.
- Women and children make up approximately 80% of the total refugee population, making them the most vulnerable to the effects of food insecurity and limited resources.

Through our collective efforts, we aim to bridge the gap and bring hope to those who need it most.

We recognize that the challenges before us are far too great for any single organization to tackle alone. That's why we actively seek meaningful partnerships with individuals, teams, and like-minded organizations who share our passion for creating lasting impact and sustainable transformation. The Khayamandi Foundation currently collaborates with **21 Christian organizations** to serve refugees and host communities across Uganda.

Uganda hosts over **two million refugees** - a number that continues to rise. While the scale of this humanitarian crisis is overwhelming, we view it as a profound opportunity to reflect God's love and bring tangible hope to those in need. Together, through strategic collaboration, we are working to meet the urgent needs of these vulnerable populations.

Acquired a Land Cruiser

We acquired a high-quality, pre-owned Toyota Land Cruiser to enhance and expand our mission activities at Khayamandi Foundation Uganda. This includes supporting New Life CMC, Missions Café, and the Water Project. Reliable transportation is essential for our programs in Arua and the Rhino Refugee Settlement.

This vehicle has been a game-changer, enabling us to visit the school and community in Omugo 6 - a critical part of our mission. Our subsequent trips to the settlement allow us to provide vital support to 400 students and 22 staff members . This support includes food, scholastic materials, guidance and counseling, training, discipleship, and so much more. These visits also help us build meaningful connections within the community, offering much-needed spiritual, physical, and emotional support.

We extend our gratitude to our generous donors who made financial contributions towards the purchase of this vehicle.

Letter from the Managing Director

Khayamandi Foundation Uganda

When I look back over the past five years, I wish I could offer a neat, logical roadmap of how we arrived here. The truth is, I can't. What I can say - with certainty - is that God has guided every single step.

This journey has been extraordinary: uncertain at times, yet undeniably remarkable. Through every unexpected turn, I've learned to surrender my need for control and place my full trust in Him. Not having all the answers has become a gift - it keeps me humble and draws me closer to His wisdom and grace.

“ The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still” (Exodus 14:14).

This verse has anchored me again and again. Sometimes the most powerful action is simply to trust and wait.

God's promises echo through Scripture:

He watches over us wherever we go (Genesis 28:15).

He has plans to prosper us and give us hope and a future (Jeremiah 29:11).

These truths fill me with courage to step into tomorrow.





Often it's in our darkest moments that God's light shines most brightly.

(No, this isn't a sermon - though I know it might sound like one!) It's simply the most honest way I can describe the profound role God has played in my life and in the work we do together. Verses like **James 1:27** and **Matthew 25:35 - 40** have shaped everything: pure religion means caring for the vulnerable; serving " **the least of these** " is serving Him.

Let me share a piece of my own story. At five years old, I lost my father and felt certain all hope for a bright future had vanished with him. Yet in losing my earthly father, I discovered the Father to the fatherless. The life I live today is a living testimony of His relentless grace. I wouldn't trade it for anything.

That personal journey birthed a clear purpose: to serve the widow, the orphan, the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the sick, the imprisoned, and the lost. To love and lift them is, I believe, to live a life that truly matters.

Often it's in our darkest moments that God's light shines most brightly. We've witnessed this truth at Khayamandi Foundation Uganda time and again. We lost Borderlands, but gained Missions Café - a vibrant hub that now employs locals, supports families, and welcomes partners into the work. Our Early Childhood Development program lost World Vision's partnership, but gained the beautiful New Life Early Childhood Development Center. Friends in the settlements lost homes, families, and livelihoods to conflict and displacement, yet they have gained a safe host country in Uganda and a Khayamandi family of donors and supporters who show up with love, dignity, and real opportunity.

Your partnership has been the hands and feet of this mission. You've helped us provide hope, restore dignity, and empower lives that many had forgotten.

As you begin your day, I pray these words encourage you to pause and simply say:
Dear God...Thank You for guiding us this far. Lead us still.

Letter from the New Life ECD Director

When crisis threatened education and food security, our community responded with resilience, restoring hope for hundreds of children and their families.

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Life in a refugee camp is rarely predictable, and 2025 was no exception. As international aid was cut back, many families in the Rhino Refugee Settlement lost what little support they still received from the United Nations. The families of New Life Children's Ministry Center faced the same hardship.

When Term 2 began, the outlook for our school was bleak. Many students did not return because their parents had to redirect limited resources from school fees to feeding their families. At New Life, we ask families to contribute a small portion of the fees each term. This "buy-in" is essential for building shared responsibility and long-term sustainability. With families struggling to meet basic needs, we knew we had to act.

I turned to our Assistant Director, Herbert Niwahereza, and our teachers. Together, we created a plan: If Khayamandi Foundation Uganda could provide food support, families could once again invest in their children's education.

On a flight back to Nairobi from Tanzania, I reviewed old feeding program receipts and calculated how much maize, beans, oil, salt, and other essentials we could supply for the families of our 400+ students. After presenting the proposal to the KFU board, it was unanimously approved.

We were deeply moved by the resilience of our families. Herbert shared our vision with the staff: we wanted every student to return, families to invest in their children's education, and New Life - supported by Khayamandi Foundation Uganda - to help restore what had been lost.

Our teachers went door to door, reconnecting with families. Soon, school fees began coming in, and we launched our first food distribution. The response was overwhelming. Families received food supplies worth more than double what they had paid in fees, and joy filled the community.

This past December, we celebrated the graduation of over 130 students from our Top Class. These children will enter Primary 1 in 2026 with a strong foundation - many already speak and understand English, follow routines, and maintain discipline.



Despite the economic challenges of 2025, our vision never wavered. Herbert strengthened our partnership with World Vision, expanding our water project into two additional sections of Omugo 6. We will celebrate this milestone early in 2026 with directors from both Khayamandi boards.

In 2026, we will continue food distributions while preparing for a more sustainable future. In June, we will host our first Foundations for Farming training at New Life, led by ITEC and supported by Warren Baptist Church, to equip families with skills for self-sufficiency.

Through every challenge, God's vision for New Life remained constant. Students continued learning, youth gathered for sports, bellies were fed, and the Gospel was shared and preached in Omugo 6. Our commitment to making Christ known in the settlement is unwavering

To our donors, I pray you see the fruit of your generosity and feel proud of the impact you've made. Your support has been a lifeline, and we are deeply grateful.

Thank you for standing with us and believing in our mission. Together, we are building a brighter future for the children and families of New Life.

Our Stories

Nyabuom's Story

At just fifteen years old, Nyabuom Puok's life took a drastic turn. She became the sole caregiver for her four younger siblings, a responsibility no child should have to bear. This was not a choice she made willingly but a role thrust upon her by circumstances beyond her control.

The community, alarmed by the children's deteriorating condition, brought their situation to the attention of the Khayamandi Foundation. Nyabuom's younger brothers were visibly malnourished, and the weight of their survival rested heavily on her young shoulders.

"I wouldn't mind taking care of my siblings," Nyabuom shared, her voice heavy with emotion, "but when there's no food, it becomes unbearable. UNHCR doesn't provide any support anymore. Even the SIM card they used to send us aid through was disconnected."

Her words reflect the harsh reality faced by many refugees. A recent UNHCR statement revealed the scale of the crisis:

"Altogether, \$1.4 billion of essential programs are being cut or put on hold. Millions now face worsening living conditions, heightened risks of exploitation and abuse, and may be forced into further displacement."

The Khayamandi Foundation stepped in to provide immediate relief. They built a grass-thatched home for Nyabuom and her siblings, ensuring they had a safe place to live. They also provided daily meals, a lifeline for the children who had been going to bed hungry. Before this intervention, the children

had been sleeping on a dusty floor, but the foundation also provided mattresses, giving them a sense of comfort and dignity.

Nyalor's Story

In the Rhino settlement, stories like Nyalor's are all too common. Young girls are often forced to take on adult responsibilities, sacrificing their childhoods to help their families survive.

Nyalor's mother, Theresa, was caring for 21 children when the Khayamandi Foundation found her. Overwhelmed and exhausted, Theresa was at her breaking point, unable to provide for so many dependents.

To ease her mother's burden, Nyalor dropped out of school and took on the care of half of the children. The weight of this responsibility was immense, but Nyalor had no choice.

The Khayamandi Foundation intervened, offering Nyalor meaningful work that allowed her to earn a living. This opportunity not only transformed her life but also brought hope to her family. "Through her job, Nyalor has regained a sense of purpose and stability."

Stella's Story

For Stella, working at Missions Café has been more than just a job - it has been a lifeline.

"Working at Missions Café has been, and still is, the best work experience of my life!" Stella shared with a smile.

At Missions Café, Stella found more than just employment; she found a supportive community. The leadership team genuinely cares about her and her family, and salaries are always paid on time, allowing her to meet her financial obligations.

"The management even gave me a Bible, which has helped me grow in my knowledge of scripture. We often have biblical discussions at work, which I truly value."

Stella's work has also allowed her to give back to others. Through the organization, she participated in a cancer run to support patients across the country, a cause close to her heart.

Her journey to stability wasn't easy. After two years of working for someone without proper pay, a year struggling on a farm to grow short-term crops, and hustling on the streets selling baked goods and watermelons, Stella was at her breaking point.

But in just one year with Missions Café, her life turned around. She stabilized her small drug shop, supported her husband's poultry project, paid her children's school fees, and ensured her family had food on the table.

"God bless Missions Café, and God bless Khayamandi," Stella said with gratitude.

Partnership Stories

TEE (Theological Education by Extension – Yumbe)

The Theological Education by Extension (TEE) program in Yumbe District equips pastors and church leaders in refugee settlements and surrounding communities with theological training and practical ministry skills. Delivered in partnership with Africa Renewal University Extension, the program offers a Certificate of Pastoral Ministries to address the limited access to formal theological education in the region.

In 2024, Cycle1 engaged 86 students across seven learning centers, mainly in the Bidi Bidi refugee settlements. On March 8, 2025, two graduation ceremonies celebrated the achievements of 63 students who completed the program and received their certificates. These graduates are now better equipped to serve their churches with sound biblical teaching and leadership. An additional 23 students from the original centers, plus participants from a new center in Koboko District near the South Sudan border, joined later.

Building on this success, Cycle 2 launched in 2025 with three continuing centers from Bidi Bidi and a new one in Bidi Bidi Zone 5, Ariwa. The program also expanded into the Imvepi refugee settlements with three additional centers in response to local requests. Recruitment from January to April 2025 brought in 79 new students, with classes starting on March 1 and the final center opening on April 12.





To support broader spiritual growth, TEE coordinated youth teacher training across nine locations. This initiative equipped 240 youth leaders from 113 churches and provided practical tools to 44 youth teachers. A total of 16,790 student books across three curriculum types were distributed. In 2026, the focus will shift to training Sunday School and children’s teachers using three new One Hope curriculum resources.

For economic empowerment, TEE partnered with Seed Effect to transition Cycle 1 graduates and teachers into Savings Groups. A generous donor provided 400,000 UGX in startup capital to each of the 100 participants, enabling them to launch livelihood activities and foster self-reliance.



Overall, the program trained and graduated 63 certified pastoral leaders while currently equipping 79 more in Cycle 2. It strengthened 113 churches through youth training and extensive curriculum distribution. In addition, it empowered 100 graduates with seed

capital to start income-generating projects, promoting sustainability in refugee communities across Yumbe and surrounding districts.



The TEE program continues to deliver meaningful impact by addressing both spiritual and practical needs, raising equipped leaders for long-term transformation in the region.

LEAF (Lutheran Evangelical Association of Finland)

The Lutheran Evangelical Association of Finland (LEAF) has been actively working in refugee settlements in Uganda, in partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in South Sudan and Sudan (ELCSS/S). The mission focuses on equipping refugee churches and communities with a strong Biblical foundation while addressing practical needs such as trauma healing, education, and sustainable living practices.

2025 Ministry Highlights

- **Trauma Healing:** Together with Bible Society Uganda, LEAF organized trauma healing courses in Kiryandongo and Palorinya Refugee Settlements. These courses provided much-needed emotional and spiritual support to individuals recovering from the effects of conflict and displacement.
- **Bible Teacher Training:** In collaboration with Ambassador Institute, 17 new Bible teachers graduated after completing a two-year curriculum. This training equips them to teach core Bible stories and apply them to Christian life, ensuring a ripple effect of Biblical knowledge in their communities.



- **Women's Ministry:** LEAF trained women in various communities to deepen their understanding of the Bible and strengthen their faith. This initiative empowers women to take on leadership roles within their churches and families.
- **Pastoral Refresher Course:** Fourteen pastors and their wives from refugee settlements and South Sudan participated in a refresher course focused on evangelism, Christian marriage, and counseling. This training helps pastors address the unique challenges faced by their congregations.
- **Youth Conference:** A Youth Conference in Bweyale provided young leaders with training and a platform to share their experiences and challenges within the Church.
- **Education Support:** LEAF supported 45 pupils and students who would otherwise be unable to attend school, ensuring they have access to education and a brighter future.

LEAF has also worked to teach sustainable practices, both at home and in the Church, helping communities identify and utilize their existing assets. The goal is to empower refugee communities to work together to improve their lives while keeping Christ at the center.



WWJD Water Well Ministry

The WWJD Water Well Ministry is dedicated to providing clean water to underserved communities in Uganda. Access to clean water is a critical need in these areas, and this ministry combines physical relief with spiritual nourishment through hygiene training and Bible study groups.

2026 Plans

- After much prayer and planning, the ministry aims to drill five wells in 2026. These wells will provide clean water to communities in Ayipe and other locations.



Message of Faith

As we move into 2026, I am confident that our ministry is aligned with God's promises. Paul's prayer in Ephesians 3:14-21 serves as a guiding inspiration for our work.

- **Organizational Growth:** KFU achieved nonprofit status, purchased our first vehicle, and made progress in outreach, communications, and growing our partner program.
- **Feeding Program Expansion:** In response to the drastic reduction in international aid and the surge in refugees fleeing violence in Sudan, South Sudan, and the Congo, we expanded our feeding program. This now serves not only New Life students but also their families and the broader community.

The refugee crisis in Northern Uganda is dire. The combination of reduced international aid and increased displacement has created an overwhelming need in the camps. We are doing everything we can to respond, but the challenges are immense.

We ask you to search your heart and consider how God may be calling you to help. Your past support has been invaluable, and we remain committed to being good stewards of your generosity.



Beyond financial contributions, we invite you to play an active role in our mission. We are expanding our outreach to partner with more churches and groups, and we're growing our mission trip efforts.

Food Relief for Afternoon Programs

To support educational and extracurricular activities, we are committed to providing consistent food relief for our afternoon programs. This initiative ensures that children and participants receive nutritious meals, allowing them to focus fully on learning and personal development without the burden of hunger.

Sustainable Farming Initiative

One of our major goals for 2026 is to launch a sustainable farming program. This initiative will empower local families by equipping them with the resources, training, and tools needed to grow their own food. Through environmentally responsible practices, we aim to promote self-sufficiency, strengthen food security, and create lasting economic opportunities for the community.



Expanding Our Partnership Program

Our work continues to grow, and this year we are eager to build new partnerships with churches, businesses, and like-minded organizations. The needs are vast and the challenges are great, but we firmly believe that remarkable things happen when mission-minded people come together to serve "the least of these."

Creating More Opportunities

We are continually seeking ways to serve the people God has called us to reach in a deeper and more holistic manner. Recently, we learned that several of our nursery students are unable to proceed to primary school. This deeply concerns us, as we believe their education should not end at the nursery level. We are prayerfully exploring sustainable, long-term solutions that will give these children access to continued education and a brighter future.



Water System Upgrades

Our current solar-powered water pump operates only when the sun is shining. By installing batteries, we can extend its working hours, ensuring reliable water access even on cloudy days. We also plan to upgrade to a larger pump with a capacity exceeding 2,000 liters per hour and extend the pipeline to serve more households across the community. These improvements will dramatically enhance access to clean water for many families.

Health Care Support

Expanding access to essential health care services is another critical priority. The nearest medical facility, Health Center 2, has been closed due to lack of funding. Our efforts will focus on providing medical supplies, organizing health camps, and collaborating with local health professionals to ensure that underserved populations receive the care they need. This is designed to improve overall well-being and address pressing health challenges in the community.
